## The Pastor's Pen

I want to talk to you a moment about Christmas trees. I know this is the January newsletter, but I am writing this pre-Christmas because of holiday vacations. And, hopefully, as you read this your Christmas tree is still standing prettily nearby because we are still in the Christmas season.

When you look at your Christmas tree, what do you see? Bright lights that can cause frustration when a bulb is burned out. Several years ago I finally bought a pre-lit tree. Before that I had the task of untangling the numerous strings of lights and checking them for burned out bulbs. It never failed that even though each string had been tested beforehand, once on the tree there was always at least one string that failed to light.

The ornaments. I have an aunt who likes to decorate her tree with just one or two colors and all the ornaments, ribbons, and tinsel are of those colors. That is not my preference. On my tree are all kinds of ornaments and most of them have a story. There is the one I made my mother when I was in kindergarten that she returned to me several years ago. There are various ones made by the kids, or with one of their pictures in it. Ornaments bought on vacations. Now that the children have grown, some of those ornaments have migrated to their trees.

The presents. Of course, the whole point of the tree is to have a place for the presents. There they sit. Wrapped up, hiding what lies within. Unknown. Objects of hope.

As I think about it, growing up there were three kinds of gifts. First, the hoped for gifts that I actually received. Second, the hoped for gifts that I didn't get. Third, the not hoped for gifts that I got anyway. Think clothes. What 8 year-old wants socks, underwear, a sweater, or pajamas for Christmas? Were there no basketballs left? Really? But sometimes an unwished for gift brought real happiness.
"Ok, Jeremy, enough about the tree. What about the New Year?" Ahhh, but don't you see? The tree and the New Year are so similar. Let's take it in reverse.

As we go into this year, the Child of Christmas offers us the assurance that we are loved, and the hope of blessings yet to be revealed.
