The Pastor's Pen

Ephesians 4:1-3

"I, therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, 2 with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, 3 making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace:"

On May 21st I quoted this passage during my sermon. I was emphasizing our being "called." That we are to walk worthy of our calling as Christians. I went on to talk of Richard Niebuhr's four calls — General, Inner, Providential, and Ecclesiastical.

I described the Inner Call this way: "This is the call within each of us to live out our Christianity. The call to search the Scriptures, to pray, to be active in Church. As Methodists we usually refer to this as the increase of sanctifying grace in our lives. This involves the deepening of our faith, growing and maturing in the things of God. Everyday, as you choose the things of God, as you choose to kind and loving, and gentle, you are living out that Inner Call to discipleship." I went on to quote the text above.

As I was preaching, a <u>thought</u> struck me. I resisted the urge to follow that thought in the moment and stuck to the sermon I had prepared. (I'm sure the congregation appreciated that.) But it was a good thought, and I think this is a good venue to pursue it.

While my sermon focused on being called, the <u>thought</u> pursued Paul's description of what living out that call looks like in our lives. He begins by saying we are to "walk" with humility and gentleness. Humility is "a modest view of one's own importance." In Romans 12:3 he says, "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned." Paul encourages us to remember that God has thus far given us each a different measure of faith. We have each had experiences which have nurtured, which have tried, which have challenged, and which have developed our faith. Different experiences, producing different faiths. Thus, in humility we are to treat one another with gentleness, acknowledging that God has led each of us in faith.

"With patience." Oh, Paul, why did you have to put that in there? He explains in the next phrase. "With patience, bearing with one another in love." Because we love one another, we are to be patient.

To what end? "Making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace:" To stay united in the Spirit peacefully. And notice that Paul indicates it won't be easy. "Making every effort." It takes work. It takes persistence. "Every effort." Not just try and give up. Every effort.

My guess is that the reason you chose to be a part of Saint Paul was warmth and love of your fellow believers. In none of that time has a social issue — capital punishment, abortion, euthanasia — caused you to dispute with your fellow members. Instead, you have nurtured one another in faith, and supported one another through illness, though hard times, through the loss of a spouse or a child, and many others. People making the effort to be together in the Spirit.

It is a difficult time at Saint Paul. My hope is that we will walk worthy of our calling. That in humility we will be gentle, acknowledging that our faith journeys have been different. That despite our differences, we will make every effort to remain together and do so peacefully. That everything we say or do would reflect our love for God and one another.
