The Pastor's Pen:

You really have to sympathize with retailers this time of year. How do you decide when to put out the Christmas merchandise and decorations? With candy, it is pretty easy. As soon as Halloween is over, bring out the Santa foil-covered chocolates, the red and green covered Hershey's Kisses, etc. The decorations, though, present a problem. Thanksgiving is in the way! You have to take down all the ghosts and goblins, the witches and bats. Then, put up the pilgrims and turkeys. Only to turn right around and replace those with Santa, snowflakes, and silver bells. I am almost surprised that the retailers haven't lobbied to cancel Thanksgiving altogether. However, several reasons come to mind as to why they haven't:

1. Many retailers have realized that there is no particular "Thanksgiving" merchandise, so they just go ahead and stock the Christmas items. Further, why waste time with the turkey and pilgrim stuff? So they just go ahead and decorate for Christmas as well.
2. They actually want us to sit down for a day and think about all that we have. This will lead us to think about all that we don't have. Which will lead us to #3:
3. The After Thanksgiving Day Sale, which now, of course, begins on Thursday. Thanksgiving on Thursday guarantees that a large portion of folks will not be working on Friday. What better way to work off that turkey than by trudging through the malls, wrestling through crowds, lugging bags laden with gifts, searching endlessly for "just the right thing."

Which leads me to one of my November/December pet peeves. I go to the store looking for a gift, let's say a sweater for my mom. Unfortunately, the stores have seen fit to take 90% of the "regular" merchandise, and replace it with Christmas "stuff." I don't want a sweater with Santa or reindeer or Christmas trees which can only be worn for a few select days in December. I want a nice sweater she can wear all winter. Somewhere in the recesses of a storeroom lies the sweater I want, but, alas, it has been pulled from the shelf for something that screams "Christmas."

Have you noticed, too, that many of the shelves and even the aisles are overflowing with items labeled as "stocking stuffers" or "the perfect gift." If these items are so "perfect," why is it that we only see them this time of the year? Why aren't they available to us to give for birthdays or anniversaries? Well, some *types* of these items are available the rest of the year, usually at *far* superior quality, but have now been exiled to the storeroom. Instead, ready at hand and underfoot are these specifically manufactured "gift sets" which are appealing because they offer us an easy way out after a long and frustrating search for the "real" merchandise now hidden away behind swinging doors.

Do I sound a bit cynical or jaded? Good, then I have communicated how I feel about the way the world sees Christmas. For many, Christmas is just the biggest marketing season of the year. It has nothing to do with a saving God, but everything to do with saleable goods.

Let me climb down off my soap box. I know I am writing to those who know what Christmas is really about. But I find myself sometimes losing sight of the manger as I struggle to meet the expectation of finding the right gift to put under a tree. I am sure that some of you have faced this dilemma. I want to suggest something that might help you keep things in perspective.

Let me go back up to reason #2 above. On Thanksgiving, we take stock of all that is important to us, and for most of us that is not "things" but, rather, family and relationships. Years ago my parents were moving and my mom divided up some of her Christmas decorations with me and my sisters. She gave me a box in which I found one that years ago I had given her and now she was giving back to me. It was a styrofoam ball with a wide ribbon wrapped around it and looped as a hanger. Dotting the sides were colorful, reflective discs held on by glue and hat pins. It was a Christmas ornament that I made for Mom when I was in kindergarten. Among the other items in my collection are a half-dozen "snowflakes" that my grandmother tatted. She showed me some things she was keeping — Christmas cards I made her when I was in elementary school.

Why am I talking about these things? Because they have no commercial value, but they represent time spent just to say, "You are special to me." It really is the thought that counts. 2000 years ago lots of babies were born, not a few of them in Bethlehem. But one was special because behind Him was a great thought. *For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son . . .*

This year I would suggest to you that the perfect Christmas gift cannot be bought straight off the shelf, and that it won't have much commercial value. It may be something you make or write. It may just be some time shared. It may be a phone call to family member or friend that you haven't spoken to in a long while. It may be teaching a child to sing "Away in a Manger," or taking some fruit to a shut-in. I challenge you to ponder and then give to at least one person a gift that comes from your heart, that says: "You are special." You just might discover that you want to give a few more of these gifts. Because these gifts give you a wonderful feeling in return.

May the upcoming holidays be holy days. May you and yours know the love of God, the joy of Christ, and the peace of the Holy Spirit!
